

PATIENT INFORMATION

Easy Steps for you to follow to give yourself a subcutaneous injection of Bortezomib (also known as Velcade)

Step 1:

Gather the supplies you need and place them nearby:

- Prefilled syringe
- Needle
- Gauze swab
- Purple top sharps bin



Step 2:

Please check the written details. Check that the syringe label and prescription sheet have the correct name and dose written on them. Check the expiry date on the syringe label.

Step 3:

Wash your hands well with soap and water and then dry them thoroughly. Put on gloves.



Step 4:

Sit comfortably so you can see your stomach easily.

Step 5:

Identify an area about an inch or two away from your belly button. The ideal part is a fatty area where you can "pinch an inch".



Step 6:

Pick up the syringe and twist off the cap (may be green or red in colour).



Step 7:

Twist on the orange needle. Make sure it is twisted on as far as it will go.

A loose twist means the drug may leak out.



Step 8:

Hold the syringe like a pencil in the hand you write with. With your other hand, gently pinch the identified area on your stomach.






Pinch and inject

Step 9:

Push the needle straight into this pinched area.



Step 10:

Inject the liquid into your stomach fat by gently pushing the plunger down with your index finger.



Step 11:

Count to five then remove the needle from the skin.

Step 12:

Flip the protective cover over the needle then put the needle and syringe straight into the sharps bin.



Step 13:

If there is any fluid or blood at the injection site, press the site lightly with a gauze swab for ten seconds then place the swab into the sharps bin.

Step 14:

Remove the gloves and wash your hands again.

Frequently asked questions:

What is Velcade (Bortezomib)?

Velcade is the trade name for the drug Bortezomib. Bortezomib is a proteasome inhibitor that is extremely effective at controlling myeloma and amyloidosis. It is not a traditional chemotherapy drug but still needs to be treated with great care.

What is a subcutaneous injection?

This is an injection into the fatty layer of tissue directly under the skin.

What happens if I spill the injection?

If you spill the injection on your skin, please wash it off immediately with soap and water and then rinse the area thoroughly. If you spill it on the floor/ furniture, please wear disposable gloves and wipe up any excess fluid with a disposable cloth, then rinse the area with soapy water. Place any used gloves and cloths in the cytotoxic sharps bin.

What do I do if I have a question or query when I am at home?

Where should I store the injections and equipment?

All equipment can be stored at room temperature. The pre-filled syringe needs to be stored in the fridge in its own plastic tupperware container. Make sure it is kept separate from food/drink and out of the reach of children.

Where do I get more supplies?

All equipment and pre-filled syringes will be provided by the Ricky Grant Day Unit at Torbay Hospital.

How many injections will I need?

Your Doctor or Specialist nurse can inform you of how many injections you will need. You have four injections per course and you will typically have four to eight courses.
